³¹ "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, he will sit on his glorious throne. ³² All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate the people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. 33 He will put the sheep on his right and the goats on his left. 34 "Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. 35 For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, 36 I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.' ³⁷ "Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? 38 When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? ³⁹ When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?' ⁴⁰ "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.' 41 "Then he will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you who are cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. 42 For I was hungry and you gave me nothing to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, 43 I was a stranger and you did not invite me in, I needed clothes and you did not clothe me, I was sick and in prison and you did not look after me.' 44 "They also will answer, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or needing clothes or sick or in prison, and did not help you?' 45 "He will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me.' 46 "Then they will go away to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life."

TIME TO REFLECT

Original Materials by Rebekah Fairhurst, Bolton Methodist Mission Next week Advent begins. It's only 5 weeks till Christmas. The time when we celebrate the coming of that tiny baby into the world, the coming of Jesus, the King of Kings. During this time of Advent let us reflect on who Jesus is for us. We call him King but he certainly wasn't the king that the Jewish people at the time were expecting him to be. He is our King. He is the Light of the World and we are called to share with others who he is, the Light of the World and the King of Kings.

Our reading talks about helping those in need. By helping those in need we are sharing the love and good news of Jesus with other people. By doing this we are enabling others to come to know him for themselves. In the midst of the pandemic it can be difficult to know how we can help others at the moment. Verse 40 of our reading says this "And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." Perhaps at the moment we can help others by donating food, or clothes or just simply phoning someone up for a chat. All these ways of helping others enable us to do what he asked us to do and to share the love and good news of Jesus which is needed more than ever at the moment.

There are people out there on our streets who have missed out on the opportunity of finding the King of Kings, of finding out for themselves what the real meaning of Christmas is. To them Christmas is just another holiday. They have never known what it is all about, they have never known the difference that this tiny baby will have on their lives if they only take the opportunity to look for him. We know the difference that he has made and it's up to us to give people that opportunity to find him for themselves. Let us take the opportunity to share with others who this King of Kings is and what difference he can make in their lives.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

O loving and living God, may we trust in you as Jeremiah reminds us to, like a tree, planted by water, that depends on you alone to face the challenges of the climate and still produce fruit. Let your nourishment seep into our world today through our hands, minds and voices, that we may seek to bring your reconciling love in Christ to the earth in transformative ways. Amen.

REV JOHN PUGH WRITES:



What time is it? Whenever I look at this little pocket watch I am reminded of the White Rabbit from Alice in Wonderland. "I'm late, I'm late for a very important date, no time to say 'Hello!', 'Goodbye', I'm late. I'm late, I'm late!".

Too often we are imprisoned by timepieces. I remember very well school days in Junior School during long hot summer days waiting for playtime. The hours dragged by and no matter what time you looked at the classroom clock it always seemed to be mid-morning. In fact, if anything I'm certain it went backwards from time to time! However, when it was time for tests or exams the opposite was

equally true when no sooner had you started answering the questions when the teacher would say "5 minutes left!".

It didn't stop there though for when I became an adult time continued to do strange things. Then I discovered the reason behind the situation. Some 20 or so years later studying New Testament Greek as a Student Methodist Minister discovered 2000 years ago the Greeks had 2 words that we understand as time.

Firstly 'kronos' from which we have words like chronometer, signifying the physical passage of time. Secondly the word 'kairos' which speaks of the opportune moment, just like we might say when it's the right time to tell him/her whatever. How often have we struggled with that one? How often has someone challenged us by saying "I thought you were going to ..." and we've answered by saying "It never seemed the right time"? We are very good at putting things off, determining that later is always going to be better. Believing there will be a better time/place to do the whatever (that's kairos).

What about the future? When will be the best time to make your decision about your life? Can you afford to keep putting off the decision about eternity? The time for deciding to allow Jesus into your life as Lord and Saviour is now! Often in the first few centuries the decision was left until individuals lay on their deathbed. The belief was they could confess their sins by repenting, receive absolution and enter heaven a truly repentant and forgiven person. There's not always time to do that! None of us know when we might die, now is the acceptable time!

Don't put it off – receive Jesus today, don't procrastinate!
