BARROW UPON SOAR CHURCHES TOGETHER

Christian Aid Week is from 10th to 16th May. In the past we have organised a house-to-house collection (coordinated by Frances Acton of Holy Trinity) with which volunteers from the Barrow churches have traditionally helped. Last year, due to the pandemic, this collection could not take place, but we still advertised Christian Aid Week and encouraged people.

In the past we have organised a house-to-house collection (co-ordinated by Frances Acton of Holy Trinity) with which volunteers from the Barrow churches have traditionally helped out. Last year, due to the pandemic, this collection could not take place, but we still advertised Christian Aid Week and encouraged people to make online donations. Nationally this raised around £2 million, about a quarter of the total raised in a 'normal' year.

This year 3000 delivery only envelopes have been ordered. To these a label will be attached with addresses of people connected to our churches who are prepared to offer their letterbox as a place where those who wish to donate can deliver their envelope. We are looking for volunteers from our churches to deliver these envelopes. There are definite advantages of our using delivery only envelopes:

- as we are still being urged to be cautious about our contacts with people there will be no need to knock on doors to collect envelopes
- quite a lot of people from experience do not like knocking on doors to ask if people wish to donate. We are certain that many more people will be happy to help out with delivery only.
- in the past we have only been able to cover about half of houses in the village due to a shortage of collectors. We are very much hoping this year to deliver envelopes to every house.

Heather Doda is contacting people from Barrow upon Soar Methodist who have previously helped with collections to ask for their help again and to ask if they are prepared to provide their address for people to deliver their donations.

We hope we can count on your support for this effort. In the areas of the village where we have collected regularly for Christian Aid Week many people almost expect us to contact them at this time of year and seem to view Christian Aid as a very worthwhile charity; in fact I recently received one phone call asking when this year's collection will be as they have the money ready!

Any help you can provide to publicise Christian Aid Week and encourage your congregations to volunteer will be very much appreciated. Many thanks, Richard Hudson, Holy Trinity Church

Today's Gospel Reading: John 15 v 1-8

Jesus the True Vine

'I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is alorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.

TIME TO REFLECT

Let me start by saying that I am no gardener. I enjoy doings things in the garden, but I am mostly clueless. This is particularly evident when it comes to pruning and cutting back. I tend to pussy foot around and snip round the edges of my plants. Take my hedge. It is always untidy with a sort of Dennis the Menace messy haircut look to it, in stark contrast to my next-door neighbour whose own hedge is a thing of beauty, shaped and manicured tightly.

I remember the first winter in my last house, when I was horrified by what the council workers did to the beautiful oak trees lining the Crescent where I lived. It looked devastated, like a nuclear bomb had gone off nearby. I nearly wrote in to complain. I needn't have worried, of course – they did know what they were doing and by the end of that summer the trees were back, only better, with more strength and shape from the new growth.

Pruning and cutting back is essential to the process of growth. Particularly to fruit bearing plants like the vine. Jesus knew it, hence the wonderful image of John 15 v1-8, which has much to say to us this Vocations Sunday.

In the Old Testament the vine is a symbol of Israel, but it is usually mentioned in the context of having been allowed to run wild, for example in Isaiah 5. Vines in the Middle East were (and still are) fast growing and if left unchecked would grow in all directions, with lots of branches, meaning that the fruit bearing branches produced lots of small, poor quality fruit. Quite simply, to produce a good crop, there needed to be regular ruthless pruning, particularly in its early years. Jesus says that he is the true vine, the true Israel if you like and he exhorts his disciples to abide in him, to allow God who is the gardener to prune back those useless and tangled branches, so that good fruit will be produced.

Many of us in the Church (and I include myself too) could learn from this. We take on too many jobs, have too many roles and hats to wear and consider ourselves indispensable. Who else would do it, if not me? The place would fall apart without me, we say. Well maybe we should just try it. Step back. If you do have 3 roles, give up 2 and give your all to the one remaining role. I am not necessarily the best person to invoke garden wisdom, but even I have noticed that you create a space in the garden something else will soon grow there. Perhaps by hanging on to those 2 extra roles we not only reduce the quality of the fruit we produce, but we are preventing others exercising their calling and ministry.

On this Vocations Sunday, when we are asked to reflect on the part we play in the ministry of God's Church, we should consider what needs pruning in our lives, so that the Vine produces abundant, sweet fruit. Sometimes less is more. And if you find this message hard, no sour grapes, please!

Don't wait for someone else to be kind first. Don't wait for better circumstances or for someone to change. Just be kind, because you never know how much someone needs it.

REV JOHN PUGH WRITES:

The Veterans Badge marks men and women who have served Queen and country in the Armed Forces. It makes no difference – Army, Navy or Air Force – all have served whether as a Regular or Reservist. I must admit my eyes are drawn immediately if I see someone wearing this mark of service. My first question usually involves asking who they served with – sometimes it's just a number which signifies something either as a Unit, Squadron or Ship. The numbers may not mean much unless you know e.g. Medics might know 223, 212, 201, etc. Some people buy copies of the badge from the internet because they wish they'd been involved with the Forces. These "wannabies" are usually referred to as "Walts" by ex-Forces



personnel, they stand out in some way or other, caught out as it were, because of a lack of knowledge.

My other thought is – how many of us wear some sort of mark that proclaims us as Christian? A cross, a crucifix, some form of the Christian fish symbol, a WWJD band or maybe a sweatshirt that proclaims something about Jesus? Do we stand out because of that which we wear? I am blessed because as a Christian Minister I wear a clerical collar (otherwise known as a 'dog collar') sometimes. Helpful indicator whenever I visit someone in hospital or a Home, reassuring folk who may be housebound that I am 'legit'. However not everyone wears such a noticeable symbol of their faith.

How we wear our Christian faith is more important than any symbol we choose to wear or carry. Scripture tells us we are sealed by God's Holy Spirit, Our faith should shine out for all to see. Not that this is to give us glory but so that God may be glorified because of his presence in Sun lives. This being the case we should recognise other Christians the moment we walk into a room full of strangers. At once we should know them and they should know us as the worship song states "They'll know we are Christians by our love, yes they'll know we are Christians by our love."

PRAYER OF THE DAY

Eternal God, your steadfast love is as high as the heavens are above the earth and your everlasting arms are underneath us. In Jesus you made your home among us, and you long for us to find our home in you – safe and free from fear.
